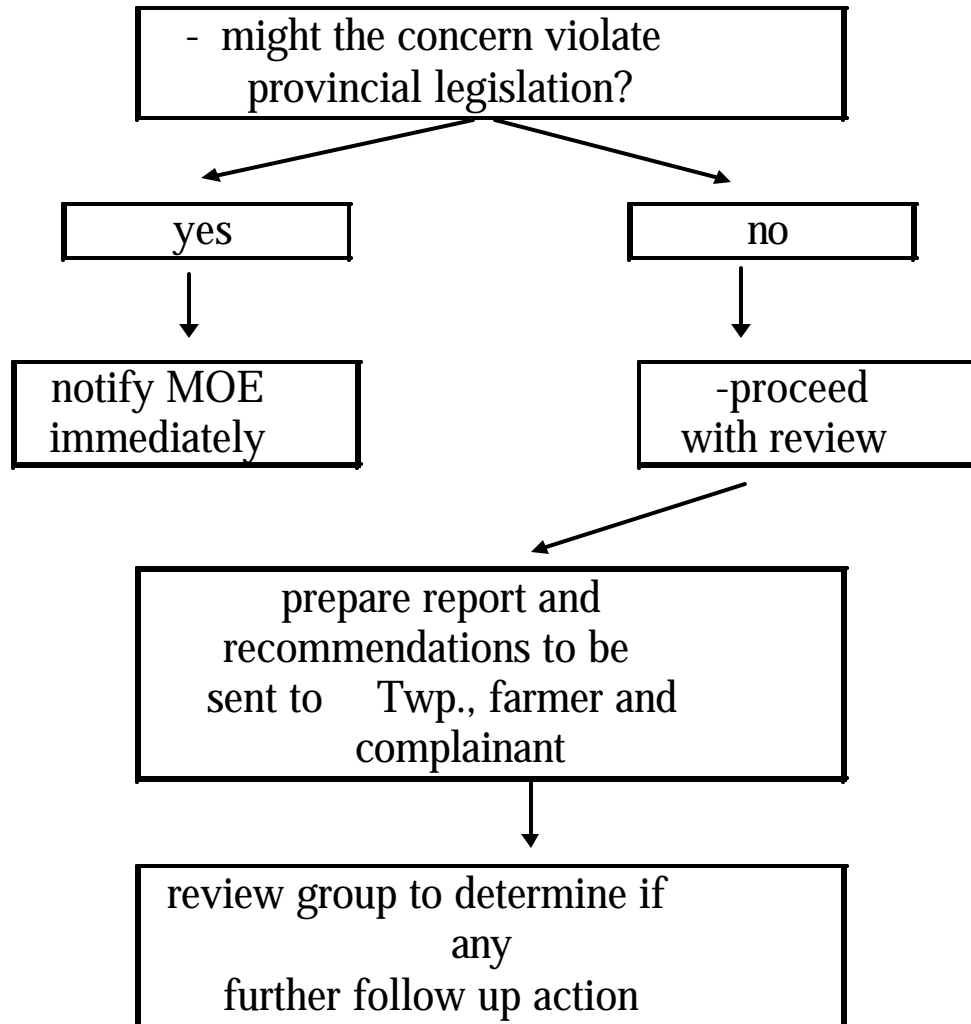
Huron Farm Environmental Mediation Committee Process



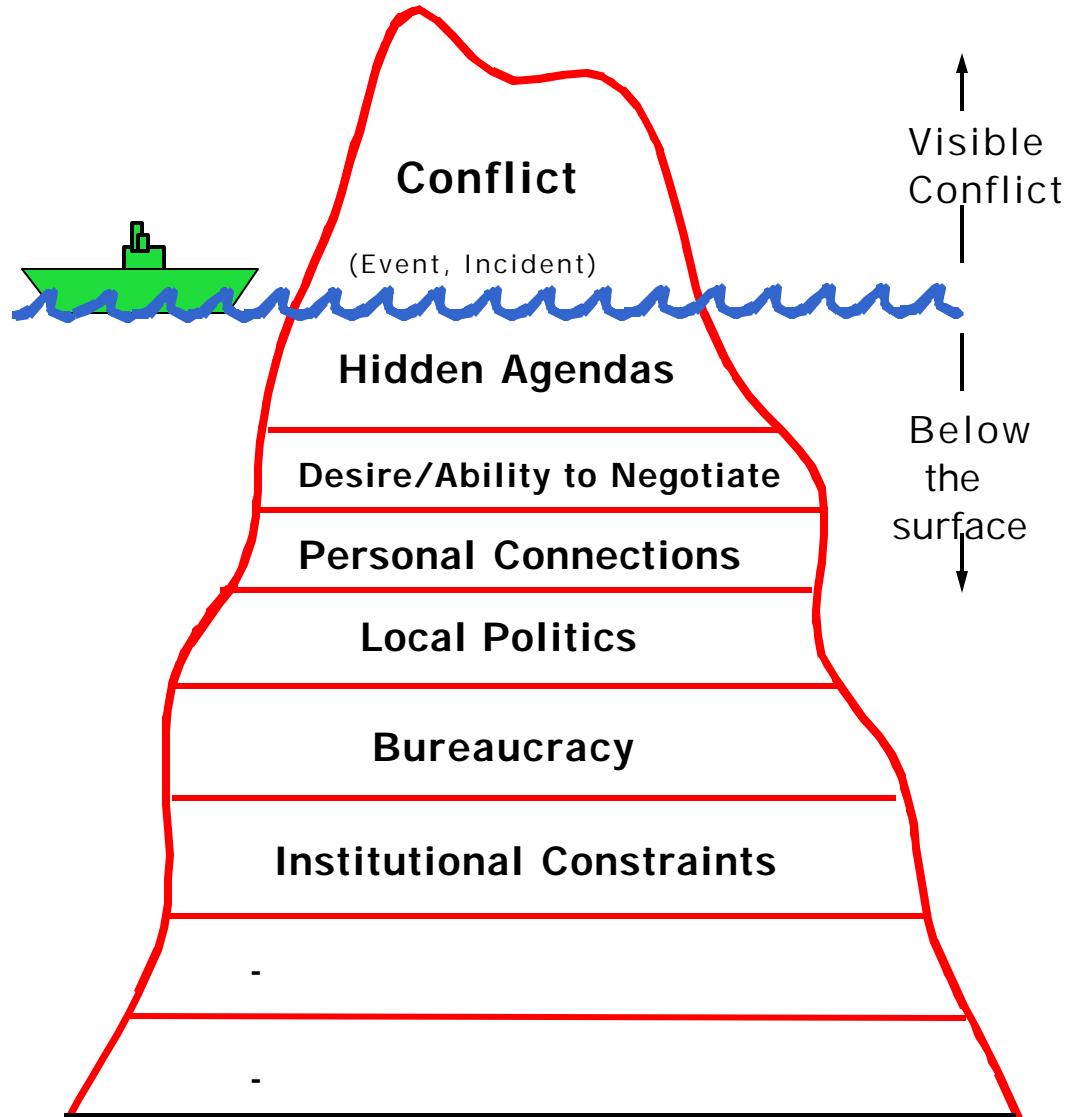
Huron Farm Environmental Mediation Committee Process



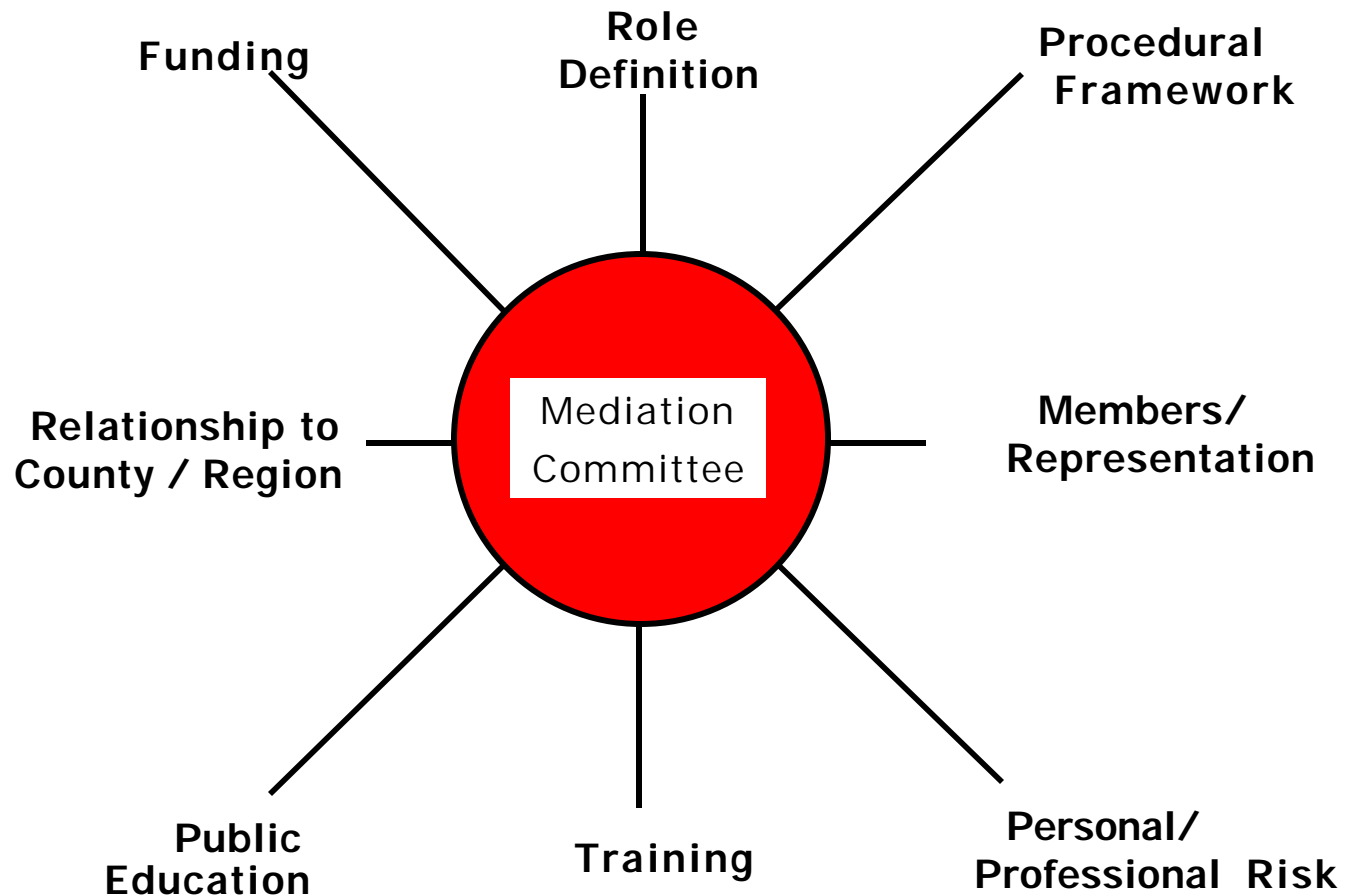





Levels of Complexity in Resolving Conflict
